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We invite you and your students to visit our sites and participate in Coastal Heritage Society's field trip programs! We operate five National Historic Landmark sites in Savannah, GA: Battlefield Memorial Park, Old Fort Jackson, Georgia State Railroad Museum, Savannah History Museum and Pin Point Heritage Museum.

Battlefield Memorial Park commemorates the site where 800 soldiers were either killed or wounded on October 9th, 1779 in one of the bloodiest battles of the American Revolution. More than 8,000 troops, from what are now eight modern countries, clashed for control of the city of Savannah. The combined French and American force failed to extract it from British control.

Old Fort Jackson, named after Revolutionary War hero James Jackson, was built to defend the port of Savannah from attack via the river. In 1777 & 1778, there was an earthen artillery battery located on the site. During the administration of President Thomas Jefferson, the United States began building a series of coastal fortifications, including Fort Jackson, to provide for the defense of major rivers and harbors along the east coast.

Georgia State Railroad Museum is the site of the former Central of Georgia Railroad Savannah Repair Shops, and a vibrant part of Savannah's industrial heritage. Construction began on the site in 1851 and the majority of buildings were completed by 1855. The Civil War brought damage and destruction to the Central of Georgia Railroad, but soon after the war the Central was back in full operation. It was reorganized in 1895 and renamed Central of Georgia Railway. The Central used this site until 1963.

Savannah History Museum is housed in the old Central of Georgia Railway passenger shed, a National Historic Landmark built in the 1860s and 1870s. Coastal Heritage Society took over operation of Savannah History Museum in 1990. The museum is home to more than 10,000 artifacts—the largest collection of artifacts in the entire coastal community.

Pin Point Heritage Museum is located just off the Diamond Causeway, in the recently restored A.S. Varn & Son Oyster and Crab Factory on the Moon River. The Museum is more than just the story of the Oyster Factory. It is the story of the Pin Point Community founded in 1890 by freed slaves, many from Ossabaw Island. Pin Point Heritage Museum, with its more than 3,000 square feet of exhibition space, artifacts and interactive displays, helps to tell the story of the history, traditions, language, spiritual life and culture of the community.

All of our programs are based on the Georgia Performance Standards that are included in this information guide, and are age- and grade-specific. Each offers an engaging, interactive and fun educational experience for visitors of all ages. If you have any special needs, please speak with one of us. Student Programs







The American Revolution in Savannah Program

Students participate in a multi-site visit that begins at Fort Jackson and ends at the site of the Battle of Savannah. They are introduced to the causes of the American Revolution and its impact on Georgia, learn about Great Britain's southern strategy resulting in the capture of Savannah in 1778 and the Battle of Savannah in 1779 and experience the military tactics and weapons employed during the battle.

Through hands-on interactive experiences, students will learn about:

- The causes of the American Revolution and its impact on Georgia
- The role of patriots and loyalists in Savannah during the Revolutionary Era
- Great Britain's southern strategy that resulted in the capture of Savannah in 1778, the Seige of Savannah in 1779 and Savannah remaining under British control until after the Battle of Yorktown in 1781
- The involvement of French regular army troops for the first time on American soil and the largest involvement of black soldiers (the Chasseurs Volontaires de Saint Domingue, now Haiti) to fight in the American Revolution
- Weapons and military tactics used during the Revolution
- How a musket is fired and observe the actual firing of the musket

Siege of Savannah Program: Battlefield Memorial Park

During this one hour program, students learn about the 1779 Battle of Savannah, where soldiers from what are now eight modern countries participated, and the impact of the battle on Great Britain's southern strategy. They experience the military tactics and weapons employed during the battle.

Through hands-on interactive experiences, students will learn about:

- The first involvement of French army troops on American soil during the American Revolution
- The largest involvement of black soldiers (the Chasseurs Volontaires de Saint Domingue, now Haiti) to fight in the American Revolution
- The role of patriots and loyalists in Savannah during the Revolutionary Era
- The impact of the battle on Great Britain's southern strategy that ultimately led to the Battle of Yorktown
- Weapons and military tactics used in the battle
- How a musket is fired and observe the actual firing of the musket

Student Militia Program (Civil War)

During this one hour program, students will be "inducted" into the Georgia Militia and be instructed in what a soldier stationed at Fort Jackson during the Civil War would have to know. They learn why this fort was constructed and the impact of Sherman's March to the Sea. A cannon firing closes the visit.

Through hands-on interactive experiences, students will discover:

- The role of Fort Jackson as the headquarters for the River Defense of Savannah
- What life was like for the soldiers stationed at Fort Jackson
- Importance of communication in command and control of the armies
- How soldiers were supplied during the war and the importance of the railroads
- Important historical figures linked to Fort Jackson
- Effects of Sherman's March to the Sea
- Use of heavy artillery and how a cannon was fired

Student Militia Program (Revolutionary War)

During this one hour program, students will learn about the Revolutionary War in Savannah and become part of Thomas Lee's Company which was garrisoned at Five Fathom Hole (location of Fort Jackson) as they prepare to defend Savannah. They will learn about the strategic importance of Five Fathom Hole and be instructed in what a soldier in Lee's Company would have to know. A cannon firing closes the visit.

Participants will learn about:

- The Sons of Liberty and the early years of the Revolutionary War in Savannah
- The Battle of the Rice Boats and the building of the "Mud Fort," the first fort built on this site
- What life was like for the soldiers who were members of Thomas Lee's Company stationed at the "Mud Fort"
- The importance of drilling and the skills needed as infantry soldiers
- Use of artillery, roles of the members of a cannon crew and how a cannon was fired

Through hands-on interactive experiences, students will discover:

- What life was like for the soldiers stationed at the "Mud Fort"
- Importance of music in command and control of the armies
- How soldiers were drilled using the Drill Manual of 1764
- Use of heavy artillery and how a cannon was fired

- How steam power and industrialization changed American life
- Contributions of railroads to the development of American society
- Reasons for the establishment of the Central of Georgia and its impact on the State of Georgia and the City of Savannah
- How railroads operated
- The impact of roads, trucks and airlines on railroads

During this one hour program Students (**Kindergarten-Eighth Grade**), will explore the railroad as they never have before! GSRM offers a hands-on STEM experience unlike any other in the Savannah area. Our interpreters will engage students in the unique science and technology involved in the daily operations of the Central of Georgia Railroad. Students will learn age appropriate STEM concepts, while emphasizing a very basic history of the railroad, new vocabulary, and be fully engaged in a tactile learning experience.

This program always includes the following age-appropriate STEM experiences around our site. Students will learn and explore:

- The ingenuity behind the smokestack and boiler room: Bernoulli's Principle
- How simple machines played an important part in daily railroad operations
- The unique wood block floor in the roundhouse: *Tessellation*

Student Program (Guided Tour)

Students will learn about the history of Savannah beginning with the Native Americans living in the area, Savannah's role in the American Revolution, the importance of the technological development of the cotton gin and railroads and, finally, the impact of the Civil War on Savannah. This program is fully customizable based on the needs of the group.

Structured programs in the museum will help students fulfill the following Georgia Performance Standards:

- Learn about the early Native American culture that developed in the region around Savannah and the impact of European settlement on that culture
- Learn about Savannah's role in the events of the American Revolution in Georgia
- Learn about the impact of technology (i.e. cotton gin and railroads) on the development of Savannah and Georgia
- Learn about the impact of the Civil War on Savannah (including Union Blockade of Georgia's coast, defending Savannah, Sherman's March to the Sea)

Student Program

The Pin Point school program combines elements of history and science as it looks at one of the few remaining African American communities on the coast of Georgia — its history, intimate relationship with the natural environment, and the challenges to retain the values and traditions of the community.

Through hands-on interactive experiences, students will learn about:

- The journey from Africa to Pin Point, the struggle to own land after Emancipation and the Gullah-Geechee Culture that developed.
- The founding of the community of Pin Point, what it is like to grow up in this community and what the future holds
- The importance of the surrounding marshes and rivers to the livelihood of the community
- The life cycle of the blue crab and oyster, how they were harvested and who participated in this activity
- How the blue crab and oysters were processed and the people who worked in the factory

The Museum offers two different School Group Programs:

1. An hour and a half program begins with the viewing of the award winning documentary *Take Me to the Water*, then a tour of the factory buildings, an introduction to the community and the people that worked there as well as what it was like to grow up in Pin Point.

- A tour of our site that includes seeing the soldiers' quarters, cannons, the river and the Fort's relationship to the City of Savannah
- Learning stations that may include military communication through music and semaphore,
 writing with berry ink, foods the soldiers ate and building a fort
- Story Time
- Learning how a cannon is fired and observing the actual firing of the cannon

Young Student Program

Georgia State Railroad Museum offers a hands-on experience unlike any other in the Savannah area for young students (**Preschool – Second Grade**). Our interpreters will teach young students about trains, machinery and railroad culture in an age-appropriate way, emphasizing a very basic history timeline, new vocabulary, and an engaging, tactile experience for all students.

This program always includes an age-appropriate tour of our site. Students will see:

- Real locomotives and rail cars in a real roundhouse
- Our repair shops, including the blacksmith shop, the smokestack, the tender frame shop, the workers' garden, the boiler room & the ruins of the machine shop

Young Student Program (Guided Tour)

This program for young students offers them a trip through Savannah's past as they explore Savannah History Museum. This guided tour through the museum includes games and activities to facilitate their understanding not only of Savannah's past, but of their role as they participate in and create their own history. Students explore a number of questions: What is history? What is a museum? Why are museums important? Am I a part of history? Students start at Savannah's beginnings in the early 18th century and then travel nearly 300 years through history, as program leaders emphasize transportation and city growth, people and occupations, and preservation and restoration.

Boy Scout Programs



Coastal Heritage Society offers a special Boy Scout Program at Old Fort Jackson. The fort, named after Revolutionary War hero James Jackson, was built to defend the port of Savannah from attack via the river. Originally, the site played host to the "Mud Fort," an earthen battery used to house guns during the Revolutionary War. During the administration of President Thomas Jefferson, the United States began building a series of coastal fortifications for continued defense, one of which was Fort Jackson. During the Civil War the fort was headquarters for the river defenses of Savannah.

Boy Scout Militia

During this hour and a half program Scouts experience the lives of the soldiers stationed at Fort Jackson during the Revolutionary War, War of 1812 and the Civil War. Learn about the strategic importance of this site to the defense of Savannah and the country; participate in a military drill, be a member of a cannon crew and signal corps, and watch a musket and cannon demonstration.

Coastal Heritage Society offers two special Boy Scout Programs at Georgia State Railroad Museum, which is located at the former Central of Georgia Railroad Savannah Repair Shops, a vibrant part of Savannah's industrial heritage. The Civil War brought damage and destruction to the Central of Georgia Railroad but, by 1895, the renamed Central of Georgia Railway was reorganized and better than ever. The Central used this site until 1963.

1. Tour of Georgia State Railroad Museum

During this one hour program, scouts will learn about one of the first railroads chartered in the State of Georgia, its impact on the history of Savannah and the State of Georgia, the function of this important repair facility at Savannah and how a railroad operated. **Through hands-on interactive experiences, scouts will discover:** The important contributions of railroads to the development of the United States, how steam power and industrialization changed American life, reasons for the establishment of the Central of Georgia and its impact on the State of Georgia and the City of Savannah, and how railroads operated.

Juliette's Family Tree Program

(Savannah History Museum, Battlefield Memorial Park and Georgia State Railroad Museum)

Let us introduce you to three generations of the Gordon Family — Ambrose Gordon, William Washington Gordon I, and William Washington Gordon II. Learn how each served Savannah, the country, and influenced Juliette's life. This two-hour program begins in Savannah History Museum and includes the Women of Merit Exhibit on the life of Juliette Low, a trip to Battlefield Memorial Park, and a tour of Georgia State Railroad Museum. The program concludes with a ride on an open air passenger car pulled by a steam or diesel engine (subject to availability).

• **30-minute Site Tour by Rail of Georgia State Railroad Museum.** During this train ride in an open air passenger car built by the Museum staff, participants will learn about the history of the Central of Georgia Railroad, the function of the Savannah Repairs Shops - many of which were built between 1851 and 1855 - and the preservation and restoration efforts by the staff. Several times during the tour, participants will experience riding on a fully restored 1907 turntable. Locomotives used are diesel or steam. 1. My group has less than 25 people. May I book a program?
